2 Create a scrapbook with your child. Talk about significant events as you record them together. Get started with tips at adoptive families.com/category/talking-about-adoption/adoption-lifebooks-scrapbooks.

3 Coordinate a display of adoption books to commemorate National Adoption Awareness Month at your child's school or local library.

4 Get out there and vote! Let your kids accompany you inside the polling booth when you cast your ballot.

5 Ask your local television or radio station to feature a waiting child in your state's foster system. Visit adoptuskids.

6 The top 100 adoptionfriendly workplaces give an average of \$7,000 in reimbursement and four weeks of paid leave. Find advice on lobbying your employer for benefits at adoptivefamilies.com/ free-downloads. Watch a movie that portrays adoption in a positive light together as a family. 10 Talk to someone who is considering adoption. Tell them about the highs, the lows, the unforgettable moments. Tell them why you'd do it all over again! Buy them a membership to adoptivefamilies.com.

14 Find an adult adoptee or a person of color—a coach, a teacher, or a babysitter—who can serve as a mentor for your child. Arrange for them to get together monthly.

15 Invite local adoptive families over for hot chocolate and cookies. Announce the event in your community newspaper.

16 Spend an afternoon celebrating your child's heritage though activities and a meal you prepare as a family. Choose a dish to include in your holiday menu.

17 Encourage your child to contribute a portion of his allowance to an organization that works in orphanages or with local foster families.



18 Give an adoption talk at school. Find parents' presentation notes for educating their kids' classmates in preschool through middle school at adoptivefamilies.com/category/adoption-parenting/adoption-at-school.

19 Develop a family ritual to show thanks for your family and the special way you've found one another. Browse adoptivefamilies.com/category/adoption-parenting/adoptive-family-holidays-celebrations for ideas.

20 Send a thank-you note to your child's teacher for allowing you to share adoption information. Send a copy to the principal.
